On Amir ("The Dissociation Between Monetary Assessment and Predicted Utility") is an Assistant Professor of Marketing at the Rady School of Management, University of California, San Diego. He received his Ph.D. in management science and marketing from the Sloan School of Management, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, in 2003. He studies the behavioral effects of pricing and promotions, the evolution and dynamics of preferences and choices, and the mechanisms underlying consumer decision making. He usually asks for drinks that are blue and sweet, and his work has been published in the *Journal of Marketing Research* and *Marketing Science*.

Dan Ariely ("The Dissociation Between Monetary Assessment and Predicted Utility") is a Professor of Behavioral Economics at Duke University. He received his doctoral degrees from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Duke University. His current research focuses on day-to-day irrationalities and on the market mechanisms trying to overcome them. He is one of the founding members of the Center for Advanced Hindsight, and he is continuously improving his book, *Dinning Without Crumbs: The Art of Eating over the Sink*.

M. Berk Ataman ("Building Brands") is Assistant Professor of Marketing at Rotterdam School of Management, Erasmus University. He received his B.Sc. and M.Sc. degrees in engineering management from Istanbul Technical University and his Ph.D. (cum laude) from Tilburg University. He held research positions at Tilburg University and Istanbul Technical University prior to joining Rotterdam School of Management. His research interests include long-term effects of marketing activity and dynamics of performance and market response. His work has appeared in the *Journal of Marketing Research*.

Stern Professor of Business and Professor of Marketing and Co-director of the Center for Digital Economy Research at the Stern School of Business, New York University. She has also been E.T. Grether Chair of Business Administration and Marketing at the Haas School of Business, University of California, Berkeley. Her research interests include advertising, branding and brand management, choice behavior, customer relationship management, and pricing. Her work has been published in several marketing and economics journals. She received the Baas and the John D.C. Little Best Paper Awards and was a finalist for the William F. His main research interests are models for shopping paths, entertainment industry (movies, DVDs, casinos), spatio-temporal diffusion, and concept maps analyses.

Sandy D. Jap ("BidAnalyzer: A Method for Estimation and Selection of Dynamic Bidding Models") is Associate Professor of Marketing at the Goizueta Business School, Emory University. Her research focuses on the development and management of interorganizational relationships and e-procurement processes such as online reverse auctions. Her work has been published in a variety of books and journals. She recently received the Lou Stern Award (2007) for her research on marketing channels and distribution with the greatest impact three to eight years after publication. Michael P. Keane ("A Dynamic Model of Brand Choice When Price and Advertising Signal Product Quality") is an Australian Research Council (ARC) Federation Fellow at the University of Technology Sydney, where he serves as Distinguished University Professor in both economics and marketing. He is also a Research Fellow of the W.P. Carey School of Business at Arizona State University. He was previously appointed as a professor of economics at Yale University, New York University, and the University of Minnesota. He received his Ph.D. from Brown in 1990 and his B.S. from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1983. He has published over 70 refereed articles in top economics and marketing journals on such diverse topics as labor economics, econometrics, industrial organization, macroeconomics/finance, public economics, international trade, and consumer choice behavior. He is perhaps best known for his work in the late

1980s that developed a practical method to estimate multinomial probit models with many alternatives (the so called "GHK" algorithm), for pioneering work (with Ken Wolpin) on methods for solving complex dynamic programming problems, and for applications of these methods to study human capital investment over the life cycle, dynamic models of consumer demand, and welfare policy. He is currently Associate Editor for *Econometrica* and *Quantitative Marketing and Economics*.

Peter J. Lenk ("Market Share Constraints and the Loss Function in Choice-Based Conjoint Analysis") is an Associate Professor of Operations Management Science and Marketing at the Stephen M. Ross School of Business, University of Michigan. His research focuses Bayesian modeling, inference, and prediction and its application to marketing.

Puneet Manchanda ("The Role of Targeted Communication and Contagion in Product Adoption") is Associate Professor of Marketing at the Ross School of Business, University of Michigan. He received his M.Phil. and Ph.D. in marketing from Columbia University. His research interests focus on models of social interactions, micromarketing and targeting, advertising, new media, sales force, multicategory choice, and learning models. His work has received awards from the Marketing Science Institute, the European Marketing Academy, the INFORMS Society for Marketing Science, the Direct Marketing Education Foundation, and the American Marketing Association. Robert J. His research interests span several areas of consumer choice analysis, including dynamic decision making, decisions under risk and uncertainty, and formal models of consumer choice. He serves on the editorial boards of several major journals including *Marketing Science* and was formerly co-editor of *Marketing Letters* and an Associate Editor for the *Journal of Consumer Research* and *Marketing Science*.

Prasad A. Naik ("BidAnalyzer: A Method for Estimation and Selection of Dynamic Bidding Models") is a Chancellor's Fellow and Professor of Marketing at the University of California, Davis. He holds a Ph.D. in marketing from the University of Florida, an M.B.A. from the Indian Institute of Management Calcutta, and a B.S. in chemical engineering from the University of Bombay. Amit Pazgal ("Behavior-Based Discrimination: Is It a Winning Play, and If So, When?") is an Associate Professor of Management at the Jesse H. Jones Graduate School of Management, Rice University. He received his Ph.D. from the Kellogg Graduate School of Management, Northwestern University. His research focuses on the analysis and characterization of the optimal price setting procedures employed by strategic firms in various competitive environments. He has published several articles in leading marketing, management, and economics journals

on topics such as dynamic pricing and yield management, Internet shopping agents, the relationship between price and quantity competition, and competitive advertising budgets.

Vishal Singh ("Pricing and Market Concentration in Oligopoly Markets") is an Associate Professor of Marketing at the Stern School of Business, New York University. His research and teaching focuses on industrial marketing; distribution channels for consumer packaged goods; and retailing with direct involvement in the beer industry, the market research industry, and markets for durable goods. His research consists of using applied microeconomics and game theory to examine how the operation of markets is affected by the exchange of information between firms and customers, relationships within the distribution channel, and the nature of competition in evolving markets. Baohong Sun ("A Dynamic Model of Brand Choice When Price and Advertising Signal Product Quality") is Associate Professor of Marketing at Carnegie Mellon University. She develops empirical models to study rational consumer choice, evaluate promotion effect, and measure impact on sales. Her recent work focuses on developing dynamic structural models to investigate consumer responses to cross-selling campaigns, call allocation in service centers, new service channels, optimal design of pricing structures in subscription industry, and dynamic customer relationship

management. Her research papers have been published in top marketing and economics journals. She serves on the editorial boards of *Marketing Science* and the *Journal of Marketing*.

Harald J. van Heerde ("Building Brands") is Professor of Marketing at the Waikato Management School, University of Waikato, New Zealand. He holds M.Sc. and Ph.D. degrees in econometrics from Erasmus University Rotterdam. He worked two years as a Visiting Assistant Professor at the Tepper School of Business at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh and has taught courses on pricing, marketing research, and marketing-model building. His research interests focus on marketing research and econometric modeling of marketing phenomena in general and choice, sales, and product diffusion models in particular.

Naufel J. Vilcassim ("Research Note—Structural Demand Estimation with Varying Product Availability") is currently Professor of Marketing at London Business School.
