Morrison now sleeps better at night knowing that the Fearless Forecasters weren't bad—they were just positively correlated. After eight years as Editor-in-Chief of *Management Science*, Morrison will step down at the end of 1990 and be replaced

by Gabriel Bitran of MIT. He plans to stay active in TIMS and perhaps form a West Coast branch of his unfairly maligned Fearless Forecasters Baseball Pool.

Udatta S. Palekar ("A Branch-and-Bound Method for the Fixed Charge Transportation Problem") is Assistant Professor of Industrial Engineering, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.
