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THE 1971 LANCHESTER PRIZE

Call for Nominations

THE SCREENING of books and papers for the 1971 Lanchester Prize will be carried out in the same manner as in recent years, with the Committee considering only those books and papers that are placed in nomination. Nominations may be made by anyone, and this is a call for nominations. To be eligible for the 1971 Lanchester Prize, a book or paper must meet the following requirements: (1) it must be on an operations-research subject; (2) it must carry a 1971 publication date; (3) it must be written in the English language; and (4) it must have appeared in the open literature. The book or paper may be either of a research character representing new results or it may be primarily expository. It will be judged on the following criteria:

1. The magnitude of its contribution to the advancement of the state of the art of operations research.
2. The originality of its ideas or methods.
3. New vistas of application opened up by it.
4. The degree of unification or simplification of existing operations research theories or methods it achieves.
5. Expository clarity and excellence.

Nominations may be in any form, but must include, as a minimum, the author(s), the title, and the place and date of publication. An appreciation of the excellence of the nominated book or paper will be helpful but is not mandatory. Each nomination will be carefully reviewed by the Committee, but nominations should be received by June 1, 1972, to give adequate time for this review.
