Alok Aggarwal is a research staff member-cum-manager of a group in theoretical computer science at the IBM Thomas J. Watson Research Center. He is known for his work on the theory of VLSI computation, the design and analysis of parallel and sequential computation, and computational geometry.

Steven Banks is Senior Computer Scientist at RAND in Santa Monica, California. His current research interests include developing a prototype modeling and analysis environment based on the ideas discussed in his paper.

Donald M. Baron is Senior Consultant at the Technology Resource Center of Arthur D. Little, Incorporated, and **Michael D. Bradley** is Professor in the Department of Economics at George Washington University. In addition to their work on productivity measurement, they have applied static and dynamic optimization algorithms to practical problems like equipment deployment and facility replacement. Their paper is part of an ongoing research problem examining the productivity and cost structure of the Postal Service.

He holds the John Kasch Endowment in the College of Engineering and teaches in the Operations Research and Manufacturing Systems Graduate Programs. His academic research centers on the design and classification of heuristic methodologies, while his industrial interests focus on the development and deployment of intelligent decision support systems that control and optimize industrial operations. **J. Scott Provan** is Professor of Operations Research at the University of North Carolina. His research includes network and combinatorial reliability, Steiner tree and other network synthesis problems, polyhedral combinatorics, combinatorial listing and enumeration algorithms, and other network and combinatorial optimization problems. Their work was the result of a semester leave taken by Feo at the University of North Carolina in 1988.

Robert R. Inman is Senior Research Engineer in the Operating Science Department of General Motors Research Laboratories. **Philip C. Jones** is Professor of

Industrial Engineering and Co-Director of the joint Kellogg/McCormick Master of Management in Manufacturing program at Northwestern University. Their article describes an approach to scheduling that arose from an industrial implementation of a new flexible machining center.

Sharon A. Johnson is Assistant Professor of Management at Worcester Polytechnic Institute. Her research includes dynamic programming and simulation, particularly as applied to complex water resource and manufacturing systems. **Jerry R. Stedinger** is Professor and Associate Director of Civil and Environmental Engineering at Cornell University. His research addresses issues in hydrology, reservoir operation, dam safety, flood risk assessment, and forest insect pest management. He has served on National Academy of Science panels, and won the ASCE Huber Research Prize. **Christine A. Shoemaker**, Professor of Civil and Environmental Engineering at Cornell University, specializes in stochastic optimization and dynamic programming, and has pursued the development of parallel and vector algorithms for solution of such models. She has served on National Academy of Science panels, and recently received the Distinguished Educator Award from the National Society of Women Engineers. **Ying Li** is Deputy Director of the Hydropower Research Office at the Beijing Economic Research Institute, where he is concerned with water resource development and hydro-electric power. **José Alberto Tejada-Guibert** focuses on national water policy and planning as an analyst with the Water Resources Branch of the Department for Technical Cooperation and Development at the United Nations, first in Yemen and now in Bangladesh. The work described in this article grew of the Ph.D. research of Johnson and then Tejada-Guibert at Cornell University, which was supervised by Stedinger and Shoemaker.
